Because of Bethlehem....

When you think of what happened in the small town of Bethlehem about 2,000 years ago, how does that impact your life now? How did the birth of the Christ child impact those in His time? And how will the birth of a baby, born as God incarnate, impact all of eternity?

Our Advent study this year will be from Max Lucado's study called, "Because of Bethlehem: Love is Born, Hope is Here." From the description:

> Christmas begins what Easter celebrates. The child in the cradle becomes the King on the cross. Because of Bethlehem, we have a Savior in heaven. These are the heart shaping promises of Christmas. Long after the guests have left, the carolers have gone home, and the lights have come down, these promises endure. No one expected God to come the way he did. Yet the way he came was every bit as important as the coming itself. The manger *is* the message.

The study will be held in person, Wednesday evenings during Advent (December 1st, 8th, 15th, and 22nd) at 7:00 p.m.


We will also broadcast using Zoom for those that want to participate from home.

REMEMBERING THE "SAINTS" OF THE CHURCH

"Faith shows the reality of what we hope for; it is the evidence of things we cannot see. Through their faith, the people in days of old earned a good reputation. ... Therefore, since we are surrounded by such a huge crowd of witnesses to the life of faith" (Hebrews 11:1-2, 12-1, NLT)

Because we have been surrounded by a great number of people who have been a witness to their faith, therefore, what?

The above verses are from the book of Hebrews in the New Testament. Chapters 11 and 12 remind us of the faith of the early leaders of our faith, like Abraham and Sarah, and Moses, and all of God's people as they went through the Red Sea on dry ground and marched around the city of Jericho. We remember their faith as we are on our own journey of faith. We are to remember and be encouraged by their faith.

November 1st of each year is marked on the Christian calendar as All Saints Day. It is on this day that we intentionally remember all people of the faith who have gone to God's heavenly kingdom before us. We not only remember the people of faith from all times and all places, but we especially remember those from our local congregation who have entered God's heavenly kingdom in the past year. We remember their lives of faith as an encouragement to us and to bring alive the hope we all have of God's ultimate and perfect kingdom.

We saw a lot of new faces at the Harvest Table this year. We moved out close to Southport Road to help increase our visibility. We also increased and diversified our hours to include Wednesday evenings. These changes resulted in quite a few new friends to share our harvest with, but it also invited some, well, some skepticism. We had several conversations that went something like this:

Person pulls up in car.

PERSON IN CAR: "Free produce? Really, what's the catch?"

HARVEST TABLE PERSON: "No catch. It's really free."

PERSON IN CAR: "Really? Why?"

Was the why the countless (literally, we didn't count) people who we were able to serve in our church and community by giving away free produce too? Was the why the several people we were able to help teach how to start their own gardens by providing free plants, seeds, and some knowledgeable yet friendly folks to answer their questions? Was the why the over \$1,300 we were able to raise through free will offerings for the Faith Promise Fund? Was the why the 611 pounds of produce that was left over from the Harvest Table that we were able to donate to Hunger Inc?

No, not really.

I was having this conversation with my wife, and she said something like, "Tell them you can't fish and you can't bake bread, but you know how to grow tomatoes."

I think this is getting closer to the why. Now, I don't want to imply any of us are capable of performing miracles. But maybe, for some, a simple act of kindness that really doesn't have a catch can be miraculous.


