# Harvest Table

Sunday: 10:00am-12:00pm Wednesday: 6:00pm-7:00pm

\*Wednesday Harvest Table hours may be delayed a week or two depending on availability of produce.

The Harvest Table will be back starting Mother's Day, May 8<sup>th</sup>. We will be inside the first Sunday with plants and seeds, and if we are lucky a little bit of produce. After that we will be outside on the corner of Southport Rd. and Washington St. next to the playground, so that we can share our Harvest with the community.

Remember, the Harvest Table is a communal thing, so if you have any extra plants, seeds, or produce feel free to drop them off. Or, pick up a plant or two with the intent of starting a small garden yourself, and if you have any extra produce bring it back to us later in the year. Not sure what your doing? No problem, the Harvest Table has several seasoned gardeners that would be happy to share their gardening knowledge with you.

The Harvest Table also supplies produce to Hunger Inc. Food Pantry. Everything at the Harvest Table is free of charge, however, a free will offering is accepted and support the Faith Promise Fund.



Anna Jarvis organized the first ever Mother's Day in 1908 in honor of her mother, Ann Jarvis, who had died in 1905 after

years of servicing and educating Mothers on the importance of their role during times of war and how they can contribute to peace. The Mother and Daughter were Methodists and the first official observance was held at Andrews Methodist Episcopal Church in Grafton, West Virginia.

Anna imagined Mother's day as a time to celebrate a Mother's contribution and work through a letter of appreciation, time in church, and through a white carnation flower that symbolizes strength as their petals are very resilient.

Very quickly, commercialism of Mother's Day took hold in the greeting cards, candy, and floral industries, and Anna spent the rest of her life trying to refocus the day away from profits, and more focus on the very core meaning of why Mother's Day was created. There is now an International Mother's Day Shrine in Grafton at the site of Andrews Methodist Episcopal Church. The building is among the heritage landmarks of The United Methodist Church. Listed on the U.S. National Register of Historic Places since 1970, and a National Historical Landmark since 1992, the shrine seeks to "preserve, promote and develop through education, the Spirit of Motherhood, as exemplified by the lives of Ann Maria Reeves Jarvis and Anna Jarvis, and the institution of Mother's Day that they established."



#### BANANA SPLIT CAKE

- 2 c. crushed graham crackers
- 1 stick margarine, melted
- 8 oz. cream cheese
- 2 c. powdered sugar 2 egg whites
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- drained Sliced bananas

1 can crushed pineapple,

- 1 container Cool Whip Coconut
- Nuts
- Cherries

Mix graham cracker crumbs and margarine and put over bottom of 9x13 inch pan. Mix cream cheese, powdered sugar and egg whites, then add vanilla. Spread over bottom. ## Keep It Burning

This is a candle. We chose a candle as a visual representation of the debt that is being melted away as we progress through the *What If* Campaign. We began this campaign just over a year ago so that we could reduce or eliminate our debt to create greater financial flexibility to position ourselves to grow in new and innovative ways and to spread grace and hope for generations to come.

The unlit candle represents the debt we had as of April 2021. At that time we had around \$865,000 in debt. You'll notice that the top of the candle is a lighter blue, that is to represent the \$57,000 we had in a fund (that was shrinking) to pay the monthly payments of our debt at that time.

The lit candle is our current debt. As you can see, it is much shorter. That is because we have already "burned" away just over half of our debt. We have done that through your pledges and gifts given for the purpose of eliminating our debt. We have done that through raising funds from t-shirts, yard sales, shoe drives, and even chocolate eggs. We have even done that by being frugal with the finances of the church and Imagination Station, so that we could divert some of our resources to debt elimination.

So, thank you for all that you have contributed so far. Thank you for your pledges and gifts, your time and commitment, and thank you for keeping this candle burning so that we can more fully bring grace and hope to our community and beyond.

As President of Perry Township Religious Education Association (PTREA for short), I want to thank Southport United Methodist Church again for your continued financial support for PTREA. Each year, through Faith Promise funds, SUMC has made a financial contribution to PTREA which allows us to continue to provide Christian religious education to 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> graders in Perry township. Again, THANKS so much! (By the way, Perry township is the ONLY school system in Marion county that currently offers this.)

However, I want to also ask for your help in other areas. In the 2021-2022 school year, we were not able to have PTREA for the 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> graders in two schools, and in another school, we were only able to provide PTREA classes in the 2<sup>nd</sup> semester. Why? Lack of teachers.

Several dozen children from those two schools, who need to hear about Jesus, were not able to hear the good news because we could not find teachers for those two schools.

Here is how you can help. First, PRAY for PTREA for the coming school year, that we are able to have PTREA classes at all 11 elementary schools as the school year begins. Pray for more teachers to come forward. Pray for the school staff, the students and their families that they all might hear of Jesus.

Second, if you love children and have a heart for Jesus, maybe becoming a PTREA teacher is for you.

Third, as time has passed in the 40+ years of PTREA's existence, the number of PTREA Board members has dwindled. We can ALWAYS have more PTREA Board members that will help chart the course for the future.

The next school year (2022-2023) I feel is going to be a pivotal year for PTREA. Please pray and consider if there are ways that you can help.
