

CHANGE

Dear Friends,

September is always such a great month in the church, and I feel that this year it has the potential to be one of the best. I have a friend who every January says to his friends, "Make this the best year in the history of years!" I always chuckle a little, because there is so much hyperbole and cheerleading in the way he says it that I don't necessarily feel. But now here I am cheerleading us on with a "Make this the best school year and church year ever!"

And I do feel justified in telling you that this could be one of the best 12-month periods in the history of our church just ahead of us! For one thing, I want to emphasize the importance of our worship time together on September 7, that's the Thursday, and September 10, that's Sunday at both the 9:00 and 10:30 worship services. That will be our fall kick-off. It's Promotion Sunday, the boys and girls in our Sunday school will move into their new grades. We'll give out 3rd grade Bibles, and this year we're also going to give out new Bibles to our 6th graders who are entering into our Youth Group, and Cross Training will be from 11:45 until 1:45 p.m. That weekend, September 10 at 4 PM, also starts some new fall programming for our Youth Group.

September 7 and 10 are also going to be the kick-off for the final year of our "What If?" campaign. There'll be a presentation of how far we have come over the first 2 years of the campaign and where we have yet to go in the final year. The "What If?" campaign, you will hopefully remember, is designed to pay off our mortgage debt entirely by our 175th anniversary, in October of 2024, so that we can be even more able to listen for and respond to what God is calling us to do as a church.

We just feel that there's a lot of positive change happening in the church right now, a lot of forward momentum. And we feel that "you are the change," the people of this church are the change, that will help to change and transform the lives of people in our church and community in a powerful way. So that weekend, September 7 and 10, the children of the church are going to be collecting change from us in their little buckets, and we're going to then collect all the change in a big water jug.

We know that people don't really carry change around anymore, so we're giving you a little heads up that if you'd like to be part of this to bring your change that's maybe lying around the house, or your dollar bills, or 5s or 10s or 20s (that'll be lighter for the children to carry!). No, we really do want to focus on the change, and we'll keep collecting until we fill this jug up to the top.

By the way, I've already decided how I'm going to sacrifice for this effort. I don't usually have a lot of change on me, but I have decided that I will go to Long's Bakery, where they only accept cash and then give you change for your purchase. I'm going to Long's Bakery as often as I need to to get change to fill up this jug! I'll do anything – and I hope you will too – for the church!

Southport United Methodist Church has been volunteering in the House serving and making meals for many years. "Over the 20 plus years we've made it here at Southport it has had multiple names, but my favorite is Ronald McDonald House Chicken." - Maggie Lucas

INGREDIENTS

3 pounds fresh or frozen chicken breast, not thick.

12 ounces Swiss cheese, sliced

14 ounces cream of chicken soup

14 ounces chicken broth, low sodium

7 ounces Pepperidge Farms Herbs Seasoning Classic Stuffing 2 1/2 tablespoons melted butter

INSTRUCTIONS

Spray 9x13 pan with cooking spray, place chicken on bottom of pan and cover with cheese slices.

Combine soup and broth, mixing well before pouring over cheese.

Top with bag of stuffing and drizzle with melted butter.

Bake at 375 between 60 and 90 minutes. Serves 8

I have been having trouble lately thinking of new things to write in these financial articles. I also think it is an important space to communicate not only our church's finances, but to give some bits of insight on good stewardship. So, I've decided this month to share with you a source of that insight for me, "Firm Foundations." "Firm Foundations" is a blog by Glenn Howell the Director of Development for the United Methodist Foundation of Indiana.

Here's a recent article:

Not long ago a man walked into the public library in St. Helena, California and returned a book. That is not unusual. The unusual part is that the book, A History of the United States, was checked out 96 years ago. The unidentified man who returned it said something about his father and gave them the book. Apparently, it was checked out in 1927, and the son is now returning it.

You ask about overdue fees? The amount was over \$1700.00. The library, pleased to have the book back in its possession, would have been more than glad to forgive the amount. Perhaps if the man returning the book had known that he would have been more open about his identity. At any rate, all is well and the book, while needing some upkeep, will be back home again.

Many of us wonder if it is too late—too late to make up for previous mistakes, too late to change direction, too late to make something right, too late to ask for forgiveness, too late to receive it, too late to mend something, too late to volunteer, too late to be generous, too late to let our lives be fully reflective of Christ within us? The story of this library book is a good lesson. It is never too late.

The time to become a good steward is now. What has been, has been. Right now, you have abilities, money, and time—and a choice in how to use them. Accept forgiveness for not doing it right in the past and do it right today. As long as you have breath, life has the possibility of becoming more full of Christ and more full of joy. Whether you are 6 or 96, it is never too late.

Glenn publishes one or two of these articles every month, and they are always nice little nuggets on how to be faithful with our finances. If you would like to get them too, just let me know, and I will forward one to you, so you can start receiving them too.
