Dear Friends:

Thanksgiving has always been a big deal for my family. Especially on my father's side. For over 75 years, as best I can figure, as many extended relatives as could get there, would come to Marion, Indiana, where most of them were from, on Thanksgiving Day, for a huge family celebration.

There is one picture from the early days, the late 1940s/ early 50s, long before my time, with

everyone gathered. One of the most prominent people in the photo, to me anyway, is my father. He would have been 18 or 19 or so, just a freshman or sophomore in college, with this huge smile on his face as he looked into the camera—he had the whole world and future ahead of him!

I remember going to these gatherings as a child and there would regularly be over 70 people there at my great aunt's home. I loved being there although every year my father would have to remind me how we were related to certain of them that we didn't see very often.

Because of a few deaths, and the lack of a big enough place to meet, and for other reasons, we didn't have our Thanksgiving celebration in the same way for a few years. But last year, we once again met in Marion, 50-60 of us, some I hadn't seen in quite a while. And the plan is for us to get together again this Thanksgiving—right at noon is when lunch is served, as has always been the tradition. I look forward to it every year!

The month of November contains and signifies so many things: we start with a recognition of the Saints of our church; it's the kickoff to the Advent and Christmas season; it's the end of Daylight Saving Time (November 5).

But my favorite thing about November is Thanksgiving, the special hymns we only sing once a year, the warm glow of our services of worship, an emphasis on gratitude which is such a central part of our faith—and, of course, family.

Whatever your plans for November and Thanksgiving, I pray that this month and this season will be for you meaningful and precious.

(A FEW HINTS FOR ONLINE SHOPPING AT AMAZON: payment will be on your personal credit card; <u>do not change the designated shipping address</u>; shipments must go to the Jubilee team member's address that is on file with Amazon and not to your home address; If the Amazon list seems small when you shop, stop by again another day since we often receive additional information from the families which may be added to the Amazon list throughout November; When purchasing an item, please be sure that the <u>delivery date is no later than December 3</u>.)

If you enjoy working with your hands, pick up a kit to make a **BLANKET.** We provide blankets for all the children and youth and we make them by using purchased kits. This requires a little cutting and tying. Due to an increase of allergy and asthma concerns, blankets that will be made at home need an environment to be non-smoking and pet hair free.

Sign up to be **HELPING HANDS.** Opportunities are: assist on set up day, Friday, December 8; be part of the wrapping and additional help teams on Jubilee Day, December 9; bake cookies to be boxed and sent home with each family.

- Participants must be at least 60 years old and reside in Perry Township.
- Transportation is available to medical/dental appointments in the Perry Township area, Monday thru Friday between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m.
- Ride requests can be made by calling 317-783-9231 or via email to <u>transport@perryseniors.org</u> and providing the appointment date, time and location. Please give at least 10 days advance notice whenever possible to allow time to schedule our drivers. If your appointment is cancelled, please notify us as soon as possible so that we can make our driver available to others waiting for a ride.
- The client is the only person we can transport to appointments due to liability concerns.
- If you have a physical condition or limitation, use a walker, cane or other mobility aid, please let us know so that we can share that information with your driver. Please be aware we are unable to transport wheelchair clients at this time. If you are in need of transportation services that can provide for wheelchair needs, please call CICOA at (317) 803-6153.
- Our drivers are volunteers, using their personal vehicle to drive you to your appointment. you will be given your driver's name in advance of your appointment and your driver will call you the day before your appointment to confirm the pick-up time. for your safety and peace of mind, our drivers do carry photo ID identifying them as a Perry Senior Services transport driver.
- We do not charge a fee for this service, but as a non-profit organization, we appreciated any and all donations to help us keep providing services to our clients. If you're able to donate, or have family, friends or neighbors who would like to support Perry Senior Services, donation can be given to your driver, mailed to our office, or made on our website.

FOOD PANTRY

The Hunger, Inc food pantry is located at the corner of Madison Ave and Epler Ave. behind Kim's Kakery, Bakery, and Deli. The pantry is encouraging you to donate \$10 this month and next month (November- December 16th) to the Meijer Campaign. This campaign helps the pantry purchase food products from Southport Rd. Meijer at a discount price.

Your donation may be placed in the envelopes on the Food collection table by the Coatroom opening and then placed in the offering plate in the sancutary. Your \$10 donation will be held until the Double Match Day on Dec 16th where your donation will be turned into \$30.

The Pantry is feeding about 40 clients each of the three days it is open each week in Oct. That would be about 520 lbs of of food passing out the doors of the pantry. The pantry buys almost 5000-8000 dollars of food every other month. The need is great and the church can help with this need.

CREATION CARE

Just a reminder that we have bins in the far east wall by the kitchen to recycle items. Also, Rosie Bishop is in need of the pill containers you get meds in for her Jacks sets that she has been giving out for years. She has handed out almost 3000 sets to kids and adults over the years. A container will be placed in this area for those containers that you can donate. The containers will need to be stripped on any personal information. Also remember to use the china cups instead of the paper cups for you coffee and tea each Sunday. Larger recycle items can be placed in the city bins north of the church at Madison Ave. and Edgewood Ave. Glasses and flags are being collected in the bins at church.

Meds can be disposed of at CVS stores when placed in a plastic bag. No containers are collected there. Office Depot offers shredding at a reasonable price and free shredding days are usually in the spring so save your discarded mail for then. In the back parking lot are two bins for collecting paper items that help provide funds for the church. Thanks for helping our planet by being an Earth Saver.

For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also. - Matthew 6:21

Most of us interpreted this passage to mean that the things we care most about are the things we give the most to. However, several years ago, the Rev. Dr. Karl Travis spoke at the Stewardship Kaleidoscope conference on this passage. He agreed most people interpret it this way, but pointed out that if that's what Jesus had meant he would have said, "for where your heart is, there your treasure will be also."

I think this means our hearts can follow our treasure. Giving can be a tool to strengthen and grow our hearts in a positive way. When we share what we have through giving, we grow closer to God because we learn to rely more on him and less on our own resources. This means we are partnering with Him in bringing about his kingdom. In this way our heart grows closer to God. And if our giving is helping our neighbor then our heart grows closer to them too.

Faith is like a muscle – the more we exercise it, the stronger it grows. And giving is an exercise that transforms lives – not only our own lives but also the lives of others. Thank you for giving.
