Dear Southport U.M.C.,



Southport UMC: A Legacy of Faith and Growth

As we celebrate 175 years of ministry, it's remarkable to reflect on the journey of Southport United Methodist Church and the faithfulness of those who have shaped its history. Here are some key milestones that have brought us to where we are today:

- **1849** Our first church building was constructed. This structure served the congregation until 1869 when a larger, 2,800-square-foot brick church was built on a stone foundation.
 - **1883** A devastating cyclone destroyed the church. Thanks to the generosity of seven farmers, each donating \$1,000, a new church was built just a year later.
 - **1936-1937** Remodeling took place, and an annex (30x40 feet) was added, connecting to the sanctuary. At the same time, the parsonage—still standing today—was constructed.
 - **1953-1956** Recognizing the need for more space, the East Wing (Educational Building) was built and attached to the parsonage, which was converted into office space. A new parsonage was purchased on Tulip Drive.
 - **1971-1973** Plans for a new sanctuary were made, and in May 1973, the current sanctuary was dedicated. During construction, worship services were held in the basement of the Education Wing, now known as "The Underground."
 - Late 1980s The Fellowship Hall (now The Gathering Place) was built, featuring expanded office space and a larger kitchen.
 - 2000 The West Wing was added, replacing what was once an exterior wall with windows looking outside.
 - **2007** A significant sanctuary remodel and office renovations were completed.

Through the years, our congregation has faithfully invested in expanding and maintaining our church home. From our 125th anniversary book, records show that approximately \$645,000 was spent on land and buildings prior to 1975. Since then, through your generosity, we have continued to grow—purchasing seven surrounding lots, constructing new facilities, and refurbishing existing spaces.

By the Numbers: Fun Facts About Our Church Facility

Our entire campus spans **36,000 square feet** across five connected buildings.

Approximately **95,000 bricks** make up the exterior walls.

We maintain 360 light fixtures, 24 furnaces, and 24 air conditioners—a big job, especially in Indiana's unpredictable weather!

There are 14 restrooms containing 27 toilets and 19 sinks throughout the buildings.

For hospitality and ministry events, we have 14 kitchen sinks, 6 refrigerators, and a commercial dishwasher.

Our 120 doors lead to 48 rooms and 8 hallways, ensuring plenty of space for worship, fellowship, and service.

Our parking lots cover 45,792 square feet of asphalt—more than an acre of pavement!

Monthly utility costs range from \$3,600 to \$4,200, not including trash removal or security system maintenance.

Looking Ahead

Through your faithful giving, we have not only paid off our mortgage but also positioned ourselves for a strong future. However, maintaining a facility of this size is an ongoing responsibility. Roofs need repairs, air conditioners wear out, and parking lots crack over time. Your continued generosity ensures that Southport UMC remains a place where God's work thrives for generations to come.

Thank you for being part of this journey. Our church is more than just a building—it is a living testament to God's faithfulness and the dedication of this community. Together, we will continue to grow, serve, and make disciples for Jesus Christ.

CREATION CARE

If you are an AES client, you can support renewable energy for just a few dollars more each month. The **AES Green Power option** allows you to specify part or all of your monthly electricity use to be generated by an environmentally friendly, renewable resource.

- Choose to offset **100%**, **50%**, **or 25%** of your home energy usage.
- The current green power premium is \$0.0026 per kWh enrolled and represents renewable energy credits purchased from Midwestern wind farms.
 - A typical customer using 1,000 kWh per month enrolled at the 100% level would pay an additional \$2.60 on their AES Indiana electric bill.

Advances the development of renewable, environmentally friendly energy sources.

- Diversifies energy supply and lessens demand for fossil fuel generation (Indiana uses fossil fuel coal).
 - Reduces carbon dioxide emissions in the atmosphere.

Creating Meaningful Impact

Since 1975, Perry Township Religious Education Association has provided public elementary school students the opportunity to attend religious education (R.E.) classes during the regular school week. PTREA is governed by a board of directors composed of teachers, parents, and interested area church members.

"Release time" laws here in Indiana allow children, with parental permission, to be released from their regular classrooms once a week to participate in R.E. during regular school hours or after school.

Approximately 70% of the children who attend these classes have no church affiliation. PTREA's R.E. classes provide one of the few, if any, opportunities that these young people have to read the Bible and learn about Jesus.

PTREA is an IRS-registered 501(c)(3), publicly supported organization.

Southport United Methodist Church provides financial support to PTREA and we look forward to having you be our hands in feet in sharing the Bible with 4th and 5th Graders.



Hello SUMC,

It's been a while since I've written one of these finance articles. As you may know, I had a house fire about a year ago, and to help manage my load, I took a hiatus from writing these articles. While I'm not yet back in my house (no worries, it should be soon), it's time to start keeping you all in the loop on SUMC's finances.

To get us back on track, this article will be very to the point.

First, the good news: the numbers look good. Now, the bad news: the numbers aren't as good as they appear. But don't stress—I'd say we are holding steady for our first month of 2025.

Giving appears to be at a near all-time high for the month. However, know that a significant portion of this month's giving came from QCDs (Qualified Charitable Distributions), which tend to be given quarterly or sometimes even annually. So, some of this giving is actually for multiple months.

As for expenses, they appear high, and they are somewhat, but not as high as they seem. It snowed, and it was cold, which is expensive for a building and parking lot like ours. These expenses were nearly double what they were last January. You will also notice that our tithe expense seems a bit high. Normally, it will be 11% (10% to the conference and 1% to the district), but we had been paying quarterly in 2024 instead of monthly, so this payment is for the 4th quarter of 2024.

With all of this said, thank you for giving faithfully to the church. Thank you for giving without reluctance or compulsion. Thank you for being the church.
